Auxiliary President's Letter

Our Auxiliary is growing. Since the beginning of the fiscal year on 1 July 2025, we have welcomed over 30 new members and added three services. We now support Frederick Health with staffing in the Intensive Care Unit, at Rose Hill Plaza, and the Comfort Cart, in addition to those that have been established for some time.

The Intensive Care Unit is likely the most up to date in Maryland, having opened in 2023. Volunteers assist visitors with access to the unit, communication with providers, and help the staff as requested.

At Rose Hill Plaza, volunteers assist patients who are checking in for blood work and other tests. The kiosks that are intended to be used for check-in can be confusing to the uninitiated, as many of us can attest. When things get busy, volunteers are invaluable in guiding patients to the various stations where they must go for their tests.

You may recall the recent announcement of the rollout of the Comfort Cart in the patient wings. Similar to the days when we circulated with the library cart, volunteers stock the cart with small items that patients can enjoy such as reading glasses, eye shades, stress balls, and the always appreciated back scratchers. The cart has been well received by the volunteers who enjoy the patient contact, and the patients are grateful.

On 1 May, the Auxiliary will present scholarships to four high school seniors who plan to major in health-related fields. The presentation will take place at 6:00 pm in the classroom on the second floor of the hospital.

The annual picnic will be held on 8 May at Monocacy Village Park, the same location as in past years. The Recruitment and Appreciation Committee asks that members bring a dish to share with others.

The annual meeting is at 12:00pm on June 26th at Ceresville Mansion. Frederick Health sponsors a luncheon in appreciation for the many contributions of the Auxiliary. Active members are invited. Space is limited, so all are encouraged to be looking for the annual meeting in late May or early June.

I have heard a number of our members ask questions about the letter they received from Frederick Health concerning the recent ransomware attack. The letter informs you that your personal information may have been compromised and gives you alternatives if you feel that you need protection from the risk of identity theft. Initially the administration set out to identify those whose files may have been involved, but the decision was made that the safest thing to do would be to notify everyone whose personal information is in the system and to offer the services outlined in the letter at the expense of Frederick Health. Whether or not you choose to avail yourself of the offer is a personal decision.

Using leftover fabric from larger sewing projects, two of the Auxiliary Sewers, Trevilla Foster and Elsie Warnock, have been creatively making other useful items for the patients. They have been busy ironing, cutting and sewing "Heart Monitor Pouches" for the Cardiac Rehab Unit. The pouches, with torso and neck straps, comfortably hold a medical monitor device for the patients. It allows the patient to freely move around while completing their Rehab activities and the pouches allow the Rehab healthcare provider to collect more

accurate data from the secured monitor.

Another project they have created is "Sleep Masks". Sleep masks block out artificial light that can disrupt a patient's sleep cycle, helping them fall asleep faster, sleep more deeply and have decreased wakefulness.

Our brains are hard-wired into associating darkness with sleep, and the absence of light provided by the mask can increase the patients REM sleep which can make the patient feel more relaxed and



energized in the morning. **Recycle** any fabric scraps or unused yards of fabric you may have to the Sewing Auxiliary by dropping it off at the Hospital Auxiliary Office. The sewing ladies are always looking for fabric donations and they are happy to upcycle any fabric into new or current items; like walker bags, busy aprons, neck and surgical pillows.

Volunteer Focus

When one considers the volunteer hours Philip Smith has given to Frederick Health Hospital, one must contem-



plate words like unparalleled, paramount, and foremost. How about astounding? Philip Smith has reached 23,000 volunteer hours at Frederick Health Hospital. Those who know Philip can always count on a smile and a friendly conversation. But there is much more than that to this welcome figure.

Born in Syracuse, New York, Philip moved to Hagerstown at age three as the result of his father's job. Philip's fathers' job as a photographer for the Frederick News Post and for an organization in Washington D.C. afforded Philip some amazing opportunities, such as the time Philip saw President Lyndon Johnson in a parade. Philip's love of sports resulted in him meeting the legendary manager of the Orioles, Earl Weaver, a baseball Hall of Fame inductee, and Lefty Driesell, famed coach of the Maryland Terrapins basketball

team, and member of the college basketball Hall of Fame. It should then not come as a surprise that Philip is a big sports fan. Although he used to attend games, he no longer enjoys this due to the occurrence of fans jumping up and down and standing for extended periods.

Philip worked at F & M Bank in Frederick, retiring in 2003. Following the advice of an acquaintance, he began volunteering at Frederick Memorial Hospital in 2006. He first volunteered in pre-admission screening, followed by assignments in the print shop and the mail room. Philip has seen many changes at the hospital, and he can point to areas of the hospital that are new and how the facility was previously configured. Philp said he continues to volunteer because he likes to interact with and help people.

Ransomware Cyberattack

As we, our visitors, patients, and the newspaper reading community are aware, Frederick Health Hospital was the victim of a ransomware cyberattack on January 27, 2025. The response from the hospital was immediate, and to safeguard systems and data, IT took servers off-line. While the IT department worked 24/7 to bring the systems back online, the volunteers and hospital staff prioritized patient care.

Volunteers and staff often had to find workarounds because the systems that provided real-time data were temporarily unavailable. For example, the same-day surgery volunteers did not have access to status of patient surgeries, meaning volunteers had to telephone the pre-op and recovery functions once the phones were back online which they initially were not. Temporary spreadsheets to record the identity and contact information for the person accompanying the surgical patient were created by the volunteers because the printed surgical schedules normally available were not available.

For volunteers working at the info desk, the real-time database of patients in the Passage point system was not available. The info desk staff worked from a static list of patients printed each morning, meaning status changes (such as room number, discharge, or admittance) occurring after the morning printout were not observable. Volunteers also depended upon visitors to identify the room number of patients. Since the Passage point system, in which the visitor identity is routinely recorded, was not operational, visitor names along with the related patient name and room number were recorded on hard copy paper spreadsheets.

In addition to the workarounds practiced by the same-day surgery and info desk volunteers, others in the auxiliary volunteered to support staff when requested. As it turned out, most of the departments that initially requested volunteer support decided the staff could manage things on their own.

Our volunteers and staff made the best of a less-than-ideal situation, and we are all relieved most systems that we have become so dependent on are operational.




